




Hurricane Beryl and the DRT Log House

Hurricane Beryl, July 8, 2024 Landfall

Hurricane Beryl made landfall in the early hours of Monday, July 8th. Houston took a hard hit. CenterPoint Energy reported more than 2 million homes and buinesses without power.

It wasn't enough that Houstonians were left without power, but the National Weather Services continued to issue heat advisories reaching over 105 degrees Fahreheit.

Hurricane Beryl was classified as a Category 1, but had the strength to deliver heavy rain, knock-down transmission lines, snap electrical poles and uproot trees.





The San Jacinto Chapter DRT was lucky as our Log House came through Hurricane Beryl without structural damage. We did have a few trees uprooted.





Galveston Historical Foundation and Elissa



Elissa is a three (3) masked, square-rigged iron barque ship. She was built in Aberdeen, Scotland in 1877 and has sailed under several flags, including Norway and Sweden. In 1930 she was sold to Finland. Sadly, Elissa was eventually abandoned in Greece's Piraeus Harbor scrap yard. It was there in 1978 that the Galveston Historical Foundation (GHF) found and rescued her. The GHF purchased Elissa and brought her to Galveston for restoration.





It was not until 1982 that the staff and volunteers completed the restoration in 1982, transforming this extremely rare vessel into a floating museum -- that sails too.

Elissa is one of only three ships of her kind in the world that actually still sails. She welcomes over 40,000 visitors annually and serves as the official Tall Ship of Texas, a National Historic Landmark, and a symbol of the Texas Navy.



SJC Lecture Series

The Texas Navy and San Jacinto

The Victory of the Texian Navy on the plain of San Jacinto in April 1836 was built on many factors, including the leadership of Sam Houston, the grim determination of his troops, and the vagaries of weather that brought the two armies together. But there was another factor that shaped the victory, one that wasn't anywhere near San Jacinto that day: the officers and crews of the Texian Navy. This presentation will follow step-by-step how captures of Mexican ships by the Texian Navy helped simultaneously to provide for Houston's army and deny Santa Anna the supplies his soldados desperately needed.

Andy Hall holds a bachelor's degree in Historical Studies from the University of Houston – Clear Lake, and a master's degree in Museum Science from Texas Tech University. Since 1990 Hall has

volunteered with the office of the State Marine Archaeologist at the Texas Historical Commission to help document historic shipwrecks in Texas waters. Hall was part of the inaugural group of volunteer marine archaeological stewards appointed by the Texas Historical Commission, the first group of its kind in the nation. From 1997 to 2002, Hall served as Co-Principal Investigator for the Denbigh Project, the most extensive archaeological investigation of a Civil War blockade runner to date in the Gulf of Mexico. In 2009 Hall helped identify the wreck of Will-o'-the-Wisp, one of the most famous blockade runners of the war. Hall has written two books on Texas maritime history, The Galveston-Houston Packet: Steamboats on Buffalo Bayou and Civil War Blockade Running on the Texas Coast, both published by the History Press of Charleston, South Carolina. Hall writes and speaks frequently on the subjects of Texas' maritime history and its military conflicts in the 19th century. He



currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Texas Navy Association, a non-profit educational organization that promotes the history and legacy of the naval forces of the Republic of Texas.

Annual Report

San Jacinto Chapter District VI Annual Report , April 16, 2023 – April 15, 2024 Sent to DRT General For their Annual Proceedings Book

Attended 2023 Convention with 15 members, and our Country Store. Our June 1, 2023-May 31, 2025 board was installed at our annual luncheon at Braeburn Country Club, with President General Carol Steakley in attendance, and presenting our new 50 year member Gwen Kunz with her 50 year pin. We increased our membership by adding 30 new members this year, and 2 members passed away. Several supplemental applications were also approved. New lighting in our Pioneer Memorial Log House Assembly Room was installed in June, completing our multiyear lighting project for the log house. The 1861 Vose & Sons square piano donated to our chapter many years ago by Erette Red, past San Jacinto president and past President General 1973-1975, has been successfully converted to hold an electric keyboard making this beautiful piano usable again. Headquarters has a similar piano in its lobby. We have had several acts of vandalism to windows in recent months. We are investigating what else we can do to ensure the safety of our log house.

San Jacinto Chapter CRT officers attended the CRT Convention in Center and received many certificates for CRT projects and the Four-Star Award. They contributed a Bluebonnet themed basket for the CRT auction. Our CRT chapter had a great field trip to San Felipe de Austin in September. They met again at the joint DRT, SRT and CRT Chili Cookoff at the log house in October and participated in a meaningful flag retirement ceremony. DRT President General Carol Steakley and District VI Rep Coyla Holmes attended, as well as SRT President General Randy Pollard, Jerry Patterson, Rolling Thunder, and Admirals from the Texas Navy.

San Jacinto Chapter continues to have artifacts on loan to the San Jacinto Museum and supports the museum at Fall Fandango, San Jacinto Museum Annual Member luncheon, school day, festival day and the Official San Jacinto Day Ceremony as chair and providing the laying of the wreath for the battle's fallen heroes. Our chapter presented 4 Thelma Maresh Scholarships at the San Jacinto Day Ceremony. We have donated DRT Award books to the schools of our essay winners; held Medallion Ceremonies for 3 Citizens, 1 Defender and a DRT member with Lanell Smesny from the Historic Sites committee attending and 2 CRT General officers participating; donated Texas Flag pledge cards to students; several members have given talks on Texas history; took our Country Store to the Texas State Historical Association Annual Meeting.

Our meetings have had speakers on the Texian Navy, our ancestors, "Our Chapter Beginning", Texas Native Plants, San Jacinto Battlefield history, field trip to Varner-Hogg Plantation, Chandler Wahrmund from the Texas Historical Commission, spring and holiday luncheons to install new members, Holiday Open House with Santa and Mrs. Claus, reception for our essay contest and Scholarship winners to present certificates and awards, and our chapter memorial service.

Members have attended the joint SRT, DRT and CRT medallion marking for Juan Seguin at his namesake park; Goliad's Presidio la Bahia fundraising luncheon at Taste of Texas; took our Country Store to 5 district workshops; Alamo activities and Travis letter; and Sidney Sherman Chapter SRT Birthday dinner. We celebrated all Texas Honor Days by flying our Texas flags, printed information in our monthly newsletter, the dates printed in our chapter yearbook calendar and stated at chapter meetings. 


